



80% of learning at school is through vision. 1 in 10 children has a vision problem significant enough to impact learning. There is more to vision than seeing "20/20". Basic visual skills such as eye tracking, focusing, eye coordination, visual motor integration and central vision are important to a child's success in school. Also, children with vision problems are often diagnosed with ADD/ADHD as they skip lines while reading, reverse letters, take longer to do homework, and have poor reading comprehension.
